Current Local Plan Policy 114 St. Albans City Centre, Building Height, Roofscape and Skyline (1994) -Viewpoint Review

Background

- 1. St Albans City centre sits on a hill adjacent to the Ver valley which allows for long-distance views of the historic city and its skyline. While the Cathedral and Abbey Church of St Albans dominates, there are other landmarks which punctuate the skyline, and the traditional clay and slate pitched roofs create a varied and interesting roofscape. The skyline is considered to be an important characteristic of the city which contributes to the significance of the St Albans Conservation Area, St Albans Abbey and other heritage assets; and the Council seeks to protect the most important skyline views.
- 2. The Council, in preparing evidence to inform a new Local Plan, identified a need to review and update the current planning policy that protects the roofscape and skyline.

Current Local Plan Policy (1994)

3. The current skyline policy is part of the St Albans District Local Plan Review 1994 (Local Plan)¹. Local Plan Policy 114 'St. Albans City Centre, Building Height, Roofscape and Skyline' identified a need for guidance on building heights in St Albans City Centre, and the supporting text briefly describes why the skyline policy was established. The text discusses the dominance of the Cathedral tower, the prominence of the other historic landmarks within the City Centre and how this contributes to a historic roofscape. Local Plan Figure 16 and the Proposals Map contain viewpoints that are considered as part of the policy. The policy sets out a Building Height Control Area (BHCA) and defined zones of visibility from middle distance public viewpoints, to protect important views. The Policy is worded as follows:

Applications to exceed existing eaves, parapet or ridge heights will generally be permitted only if the scale of the proposed building is appropriate to the street scene. Water tanks, plant rooms, ventilation equipment etc. shall be within the building envelope and will not be acceptable if they impair the roofscape or exceed the height limitations.

Within the Building Height Control Area shown on the Inset Map, proposals shall be compatible with the local roofscape and not break the skyline or mask the skyline features shown on Figure 16.

Within the Zones of Visibility as shown on the Proposals Map (Sheets 3 and 4, St. Albans City Centre Inset Map and Fleetville Inset Map) and Figure 16, proposals shall not obscure or detract from views of the historic roofscape of the Building Height Control Area.

Current National Guidance and Other LPA Approaches

- 4. A review of current national guidance and the approach of comparable Local Planning Authorities (LPAs) has been undertaken, in order to assess the way forward for St Albans' new Local Plan
- 5. The National Design Guide 2021² (NDG) sets out that proposals for tall buildings (and other buildings with a significantly larger scale or bulk than their surroundings) require special consideration; including in relation to their location and siting, relationship to context, impact on local character, views and sight lines. Historic England's 2022 Advice Note 4 on Tall Buildings³ sets out guidance in relation to tall buildings, including their impacts on views and skyline; and states that a tall building policy should address a development's impact on local character, views and sight lines.
- 6. Cambridge City Council protect their skyline under Policy 60 'Tall buildings and the skyline in Cambridge' of the Local Plan⁴, adopted 2018. Supporting text sets out the characteristics of the skyline and reasons why it is considered worthy of protection, including a brief description of the heritage assets within the historic core. There is a separate appendix for tall buildings and the skyline which is very detailed, and contains maps illustrating the historic core, landmark buildings, and important long, medium and short range views. The document also includes guidance on the documents required to assess the impact, including the need for clear and accurate images.
- 7. Oxford City Council use a combination of detailed guidance documents and policy in their Local Plan⁵, adopted 2020. Local Plan Policy DH2 'Views and building heights' sets out specific requirements for proposals within an identified 'Historic Core Area' or within identified 'view cones' that may impact on roofscape and the foreground part of views; and requires development to be assessed against the characteristics and significance of the skyline and view cones identified in the guidance notes. The 'Assessment of the Oxford View Cones' 2015 Report⁶ discusses 10 separate view cones and analyses each view in depth. The history, values and significance as well as the physical characteristics are set out for each view.

8. York City Council uses the York 'Central Historic Core' Conservation Area Appraisal (YCHCCA)⁷ to identify key views and describe the significance and characteristics of the skyline. The YCHCCA frames the skyline policy around the designated and non-designated heritage assets within the city and how this forms part of their setting. The LPA then assess whether or not proposals would impact upon the setting of these heritage assets using the relevant sections of the NPPF.

Approach for St Albans new Local Plan

- 9. Following a review of current Local Plan Policy, current National Guidance and other LPA approaches, as summarised above, the Council considers that the general approach to protecting the skyline of central St Albans under the current Local Plan policy is robust. The current approach in St Albans with the identified BHCA, viewpoints and the zones of visibility; is comparable to the approach taken by Oxford City Council with its identified 'Historic Core Area' and 'View Cones', which is cited as best practice in the Historic England guidance. However, there is a need to review and amend the viewpoints and zones of visibility to take account of development in the intervening period. This 'Viewpoint Review' provides such a review and recommends how the viewpoints should be amended for the new Local Plan.
- 10. There may, in future, be a combination of policy plus guidance on how to use the Local Plan policy, including information on what is required for an adequate visual impact assessment and links to national guidance. This would allow the skyline to be protected under policy, whilst supported by guidance which can be updated more easily and regularly than policy. This flexibility would allow the document to respond to development pressures, changes in technology, and national policy and guidance. However, such guidance would follow adoption of the new Local Plan.

Scope

- 11. This report presents the analysis and recommendations of the 'Viewpoint Review.' It comprises a review of the 'Public Viewpoint' locations and the visibility of the 'Skyline Features' as shown on the current policy 'Figure 16 – St. Albans City centre, Building Height Control Area and Zones of Visibility.'
- 12. The 'Building Height Control Area' was not considered as part of the review, and will remain unchanged within the new policy, as shown on the current Figure 16.
- 13. New views were not identified, unless closely associated with an existing viewpoint. There may be other sensitive visual receptors and valued views from elsewhere within the townscape and its landscape setting, and the new policy will require that these are addressed accordingly.

Methodology



- 14. The methodology was informed by current guidance and other local planning authority approaches, as referenced above.
- 15. The visual analysis was carried out in line with industry good practice guidance for visual appraisal 'Guidelines for Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment, Third edition,' (Landscape Institute and Institute of Environmental management and Assessment).
- 16. The review was carried out by the Council's Landscape Team, and the findings and recommendations were discussed and ratified by Spatial Planning and Design and Conservation Officers.
- 17. A total of 16 no. viewpoints (A-P) were assessed as shown on Figure 1 and listed in the table below.
- 18. Site visits were carried out to each viewpoint on 14th February 2024, when the trees were not in leaf and therefore provided the least visual screening, in order to represent the worst-case scenario.
- 19. A 'Viewpoint Survey Sheet' was completed at each viewpoint. A template survey sheet and guidance are provided in Appendix 1.
- 20. Photographs were taken at each viewpoint. The photos are not to scale and are provided for context only. The completed survey sheets and photographs are provided in Appendix 2.
- 21. The area surrounding each viewpoint was also surveyed, and photos were taken from any additional sensitive receptors from which the view was considered to be of value.
- 22. Recommendations were made for each existing viewpoint, including retain / extend / relocate / remove, and are summarised in the table below.
- 23. Where views have become interrupted or screened by intervening vegetation, which are not protected by TPO or Conservation Area designation (and therefore could be removed in the future without a further consent)then only limited weight is given to the current presence of this vegetation. Therefore, in such cases it is generally recommended to retain and protect the view, albeit a judgment is made on a case-by-case basis.

Viewpoints and Summary of Recommendations

24. The viewpoint recommendations are summarised in the table below and shown on Figure 2:



D. I	Redbourn Road	Retain and extend viewpoint along highway in both directions.
E. `	Verulamium Park	Retain and relocate to follow line of footpath (St Albans City 033).
F. 1	Mud Lane - Footpath	Retain and extend along Mud Lane to meet The Causeway at terminus of Viewpoint E in the west and Holywell Hill in the east; and ensure that zone of visibility extends across all areas from which views are experienced.
G. \$	St Stephens - Footpath	Retain and extend viewpoint northwards and southwards along highway. Extend viewpoint G or create new viewpoint to include 'St Stephens Hill Pond' open space.




